The Connecticut Chapter of the American Institute of Architects Announces the 2023 Architecture Awards

(New Haven, CT, January 4, 2024) The Connecticut Chapter of the American Institute of Architects (AIA Connecticut) celebrated their annual Awards Gala on December 7th at The Aqua Turf Club in Plantsville, CT.

The occasion commemorates the achievements in residential and commercial architecture, recognizing the influential role architecture plays in shaping business performance. It also highlights emerging professionals who have demonstrated exceptional contributions to their field and underscores the profound impact individuals or groups can have on the world of architecture and our organization.

A total of 46 awards were conferred upon both individuals and firms from a pool of 197 submissions. Additionally, the event featured the acknowledgment of membership milestones, commemorating 25-and 50-year achievements. The pinnacle of the ceremony was the announcement of the 2023 Project of the Year, **Chengdu Museum of Natural History**, Pelli Clarke & Partners, New Haven, CT, an extraordinary project recognized by the Design Awards Jury for standing out among the submissions.

"Once again, we have the opportunity to celebrate and applaud design excellence in Connecticut and beyond, recognizing the profound impact of architecture," said Gina Calabro, AIA Connecticut Executive Director and CEO. "These firms and individuals, chosen by juries of their peers, stand as a testament to exceptional creativity and innovation."
